Bayada Division Director Tom Mylet Appointed President of The Association for Home and Hospice Care of North Carolina

Winston-Salem, NC – July 12, 2011 – Tom Mylet, a division director with Bayada Nurses, a national home care agency with over 40 locations in North Carolina, has been appointed as president of the Association for Home and Hospice Care of North Carolina (AHHC).

Mylet has been a member of the AHHC board for the past four years. "This is a very difficult economic climate," said Mylet. "The state recently reduced Medicaid reimbursement rates by 2 percent, and now is in the process of redefining eligibility

requirements, making it more difficult for the elderly and disabled to receive services. The AHHC is working to maintain the same level of home care by avoiding further cuts, and helping improve ease of access to home care for those who are truly in need."

Mylet is no stranger to the challenges faced by the home care industry. His nearly three decade career began in 1982 when he served as director of a Bayada Nurses office in Philadelphia. In 1990, he moved to Winston-Salem where he opened Bayada's first North Carolina location. Today, as division director, he has responsibility for 15 offices providing home care for children, adults, and seniors. His role also includes involvement in Bayada's Operational Quality Assurance Review Group, designed to ensure smooth operations throughout all of Bayada's 190 offices serving people in 20 states.

Mylet also serves as a trustee for the Foundation for Community Based Care, a nonprofit branch of the AHHC dedicated to the education and training of nursing assistants and home health aides.

Mylet lives in Winston-Salem with his wife Marianne and daughters Olivia, 23, and Chloe, 19. In his spare time he enjoys playing the banjo, guitar, and mandolin.
